CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY COMMISSION RECALL NOTIFICATIONS

MAGELLAN EXPANDS RECALL ON LEADCARE II, PLUS, AND ULTRA BLOOD LEAD TESTS



On September 1, 2021 Magellan Diagnostics, Inc., expanded the Class I recall of its LeadCare Test Kits from 13 to 24 lot numbers due to a significant risk of falsely low results. Impacted LeadCare Test Kit lots may underestimate blood lead levels when processing patient blood samples.

Customers should discontinue use of all LeadCare Test Kits lots identified as part of the recall and quarantine remaining inventory.
