RECALL NOTIFICATIONS



The following items have been recalled for containing levels of lead exceeding the federal lead content ban:

Cinnamon Apple Sauce/Puree Pouches



On October 30, WanaBana recalled their WanaBana Apple Cinnamon Fruit Purée. Since then, the [recall has been expanded](#) to include the Schnucks-brand and Weis-brand cinnamon applesauce pouches.

Creativity Street Assorted Craft Buttons



On November 02, Dixon Ticonderoga recalled their [Creativity Street Assorted Craft Buttons](#).

These were sold from May 2022 through July 2023 at Blick Art Materials and Staples stores nationwide and online at quill.com, schoolspecialty.com, sprichards.com, and aquaphoenixsci.com.

LAOION Children's Cups



On November 16, LAOION and Amazon recalled their [8 oz Children's Cups](#).

These cups were sold online at Amazon.com from March 2023 through May 2023.

PandaEar Steel Toddler Cups



On November 22, PandaEar recalled their [Stainless Steel Toddler Cups](#).

These were sold online at Amazon.com from May 2023 through August 2023.

Tiblue Children's Cups



On November 30, Tiblue and Amazon recalled their [8 oz and 12 oz Children's Cups](#).

These cups were sold online at Amazon.com from August 2021 through July 2023

Klickpick Home Children's Cup Sets



On November 30, Klickpick Home recalled their [Children's Cup Sets](#).

These were sold online at Amazon.com from March 2023 through September 2023.

If your child has been exposed to any of these products, consider asking your

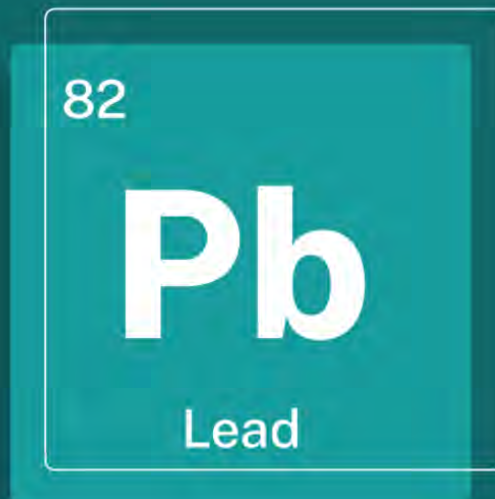
healthcare provider for a blood lead test.

The [Consumer Product Safety Commission \(CPSC\)](#) recalls products such as toys and furniture with unsafe levels of lead. Lead exposure can lead to cognitive and behavioral problems, especially for children under 6 years old. Consumers should immediately discontinue use of the recalled product and, when applicable, contact the manufacturer for a refund.

LEAD IN NEVADA

Parents and caregivers are advised not to eat, sell, or serve these recalled cinnamon-containing apple sauce and apple puree pouches to children:

- WanaBana apple cinnamon fruit puree pouches

- Schnucks-brand cinnamon-flavored applesauce pouches and variety pack
- Weis-brand cinnamon applesauce pouches

As of December 15, 2023, the CDC has received **205 reports** of increased blood lead levels from **33 different states**, potentially linked to recalled products. To date, confirmed reports were for children under 6 years of age.

Southern Nevada Health District suspends health permit of **Harmonic Innerprizes**



[Local supplement product testing](#) finds lead at levels that may be a health concern in the following products:

- Etherium Red Decision Powder
- Etherium Gold Focused Brain Powder
- Etherium Black Re-action Neutralizer Powder

SNHD reports that these products may be concerning for children (ages 6 and younger) and for persons who are pregnant or able to become pregnant.

EPA announces plan to remove all lead pipes from US water systems within 10 years

On November 30, 2023, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced the proposed [Lead and Copper Rule Improvements \(LCRI\)](#).

Key points include:

- Achieving 100% lead pipe replacement within 10 years
- Improving tap water sampling
- Lowering the lead action level from 15 µg/L to 10 µg/L
- Strengthening protections to reduce exposure

These initiatives strengthen public health protections for children and families across the nation.

Barriers Related to Childhood Lead Poisoning Among Nepali-Speaking Bhutanese Parents in the United States



[Knowledge, Attitudes, Practices, and Prevention Barriers Related to Childhood Lead Poisoning Among Nepali-Speaking Bhutanese Parents in Northeast Ohio, United States](#)

Nepali-speaking Bhutanese (NSB) form one of the largest refugee groups to have relocated to the United States within the past 15 years. Although there have been studies on caregiver knowledge of childhood lead prevention among Black and White Americans, research on this topic is limited among resettled refugee groups such as the NSB community and other ethnic communities in the US.

This study highlights the emerging importance of designing custom-tailored approaches for community groups that respect, integrate, and are considerate of cultural traditions when developing public health intervention programs.
